




The students will receive their end of semester reports at the end of this term. These will be send home in addressed envelopes.




PAT tests—these are standardised tests in the traditional test booklet format. Students complete a Maths and a Reading Comprehension PAT test.



On demand tests. These are tests on the computer or iPad. They are adaptive. This means the questions are made easier or harder depending upon previous answers. The students in Years 2 and above complete a number of these on reading, writing and maths. The maths topics are broken down into number and algebra, measurement and data, and statistic and probability.



Juniper stops eating, she refuses to return to school and her parents become increasingly desperate. Finally, after exhausting all other avenues her parents resort to the only thing they have left, a giant singing robot.

Robot Song is a genuine family show. It is joyful and full of hope. It is for any child who has ever felt isolated or pushed to the margins and any parent desperate for tools to help. The show employs cutting edge digital technology, startling animatronics and a beautiful original musical score.


Trinket the Robot is an interactive puppet show, based on the tale of Pinocchio, which explores emotions and shows children how to understand different feelings.

If you do, this is the book for you.








Woolworths Earn & Learn program


